

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Takeaway **Learnings**

- The budget 2021 is a transition between containment by the pandemic to restructuring the economy post-lockdown.
- Teachers and educators now fear that 1/3rd of children may not return once schools reopen as the pandemic has hit their safety and employment of parents.
- The NEP is a rescue from the old British trenches of an education system to a liberal and empowering one in a growing nation.
- However, the government cutting down on Rs.6,000 crore for educational spending is not well-received for the sector to resurrect from dropout rates and learning losses.
- Moreover, more funds must have directed towards educational institutions to acclimate to the NEP 2020.
- Partnering Sainik schools with NGOs and other schools will set a new definition of education and knowledge.
- The pandemic has graded school and students into two: the ‘haves’ and ‘have nots’. It has had a psychosocial and nutritional effects on student’s and educator’s minds and bodies alike.
- By establishing 750 Eklavya model schools in tribal areas and a central university in Leh, India is definitely a small step for a 100% literacy rate.
